MAY MESSAGE FROM PASTOR RICK HILL

"Be still, and know that I am God..." - Psalm 46

"Worship the Lord your God, and his blessing will be on your food and water. I will take away sickness from among you." - Exodus 23:25



Every Sunday morning millions of people dutifully head off to a church to attend worship services. There they will spend an hour or two doing something that most of them have given little thought to. It is simply something that good Christians do.

What is worship and why does God instruct us to do it?

There are some who think that God is a super egomaniac who finds great pleasure in having people bow down and worship the Almighty. Like some narcissistic rock star God just loves to hear the roar of the crowd.

What is really going on?

I believe that it is right and proper to begin the week with worship. There are several reasons:

#1 - We are reminded that God is. Throughout the week the world would have us forget about God. Forget about miracles. Forget about wonders. Forget about rules. Forget about visions. The world is nothing more than a series of chemical reactions with no purpose, no destiny. Everything boils down to chemical and mathematical equations and none of us really matter. But worship reminds us that we were created by a loving God who is actively involved in the world often working outside the



predictable equations. There is mystery, there is wonder. And we are on a pathway with a marvelous destination. God is behind it all, in it all, through it all. "Be still, and know that I am God..."

#2 – We are reminded that we are not God. Too often we think we are. We think that we know everything. Or we think that we have responsibility for everything. We know some things and we have responsibility for some things. But the rest is up to God.

#3 – We are reminded that we are stewards of God's creation. God put Adam, and all the rest of us, into the Garden to till it and to keep it. The Garden is not just some little patch of vegetables. It is all of Creation – plants, animals, oceans, rocks, humans. Our task is



to help that Garden flourish so that it will be the Garden God designed it to be. We all have roles to play in that stewardship, we all have different talents that can be employed.

#4 – We are reminded that we are not alone. God is with us. God's care for us is funneled through the community that is around us and it is funneled through our own lives. We are the instruments that God uses to accomplish much of the work of healing, restoring, empowering, uplifting, and loving that is needed in our world. God created us to be in community with one another because none of us can carry the world by ourselves.

#5 - We are reminded that there are moral and ethical boundaries. The world doesn't want to hear that and would rather think that we just make stuff up as we go along. If we are going to live in community with all of Creation, then we need some boundaries to hold us back from sin that destroys community. We cannot allow greed and corruption to rule our lives. We need an outside source to create boundaries for us.



Worship becomes an opportunity for us to reset our path. We are reminded of where we need to go and how we need to get there. Through worship we can re-evaluate or lives on a weekly basis. All of that means, however, that it is not just up to the pastor or worship leader to create the experience. It also depends on those who gather to come with an attitude of worship.

Psalm 100 says, "Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise!" Sunday morning worship is not some

dreary task that we are forced into week after week. *It is a time for us to rejoice that God still loves us, that God still calls us, that God is still with us.* It is a time for us to, once again, discover our purpose in the larger cosmos. We can hear God's voice in the music, the scriptures, the prayers, the sermons, but only if we consciously listen for it.

In a world that would rather have us forget about God, worship is a time for us to remember God, to bring God back into the center of our lives, to explore anew what it means to follow in the footsteps of Christ.


