

# MONTEREY and BEULAH December 2022 eNewsletter

**Advent** — Early Christians started celebrating Advent around 300 AD as a time of fasting and asking God for forgiveness of their sins. It became a tradition first in the Catholic church.

By the 1830's, the Lutheran Church started using a wreath with candles during the season of Advent. Today, all Christian denominations recognize Advent, although traditions can differ or not be practiced at all.

Last year, pastor Rick Hill focused on the names for Jesus from the "Messiah" during worship. This year we are loosely following the traditional themes used when lighting the Advent candles.

❖ Week 1 – Hope usually purple
 ❖ Week 2 – Peace usually purple

❖ Week 3 – Joy usually pink or purple

❖ Week 4 – Love usually purple

Christmas Eve or Christmas Day service white

Once again, if a reporter asked me today how I was preparing for Christmas, I'd probably say, "I'm cleaning my house so I can decorate, thinking of a holiday menu and grocery shopping, finishing the gifts I'm making and any last minute shopping, trying to send a few Christmas cards with personal notes, and so on. Just writing that down is a startling reminder that I'm completely missing the opportunity Advent gives me to prepare myself spiritually. How about you, do you feel the same?

Advent means "coming" and is a liturgical season where we can celebrate:

Christ has come into our world.

Christ is coming into our lives.

Christ will come again to fulfill our hope for a new world of peace and love.

As Christians, we know that Christmas is about Jesus, but when I look at the 4 weeks between now and Christmas Day, how many of my days and hours are devoted to preparing for the birth of Christ?

Let's take the opportunity this year to make time to prepare ourselves for Christmas. Here are a few ideas:

- Let's help children understand that waiting and hoping this time of year is more than thinking about Santa.
- Attend a worship service every week. If you can't participate in person, join a service online or via radio or TV.
- Participate in one of the weekly activities or mission projects offered by either church. We draw closer together as a church family when we anticipate the birth of Christ together.
- Really listen to the words of Advent of hymns. This week we will sing the first verse of "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus". Repeat it as a poem or prayer during the week.
- Make yourself an Advent calendar or wreath to help you dedicate time for preparation.
- Set up a nativity in your home and think about, or discuss with family, the journey of Mary and Joseph.
- Sit in the presence of God, even for a minute, and rest your mind, body and soul.
- Pray for those you know, or those you know about, who are suffering.

The suggestions above are just a start. Many of you are already doing your own or will come up with new ideas. Please feel free to share them, either in a photo or writing a brief description to share in the newsletter.


